
### **Morning Prayer at Asbury First**



## COC Closed June 30 through July 6 for Holiday



# PENTECOST 2025

Yesterday, June 8, was the 50th and final day of the Easter season: Pentecost Sunday. On Pentecost we celebrated the activity of the Holy Spirit in our world, communities, and lives.

The assigned scripture reading for the day commemorates what is often called, 'the birth of the Church' and tells the possibly familiar story of rushing wind, tongues of fire and miraculous understanding across language barriers.

Just after this reading, the scriptural account goes on to say:

"Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand were added to their number that day. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer...All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts..."

In the Pentecost story, the Holy Spirit shows up in a very dramatic way. **The Spirit stirred hearts and the Church was born as early disciples committed themselves to community care.** 

The same Spirit that moved amongst those early believers is moving in the world today. Hearts are being stirred, lives are being devoted to community care, the Church is being constantly reborn.

The work we do in the Community Outreach Center and in partnership with other organizations serving Rochester and the world is one example of this activity. Speaking truth to power in advocacy efforts as/alongside vulnerable people is another. People of faith are currently rallying against policies that threaten to increase the suffering of our most marginalized neighbors:



Groups of clergy and faith leaders have faced arrest on three different occasions in recent weeks for praying for the poor in the Capitol Rotunda. Drawing attention to the harm that will be done by the tax and spending bill currently being considered in Congress, the Rev. Dr. William Barber III points out that "Congress starts each day with its own prayers to the Almighty even while preying on the poor." He and his colleagues have been repeatedly gathering outside the Supreme Court and marching on the Capitol – and their numbers are growing.

Many Christian organizations are sponsoring a vigil and processional titled "A Pentecost Witness for a Moral Budget" in Washington on June 10th. Our own United Methodist General Secretary of the General Board of Church and Society, Bishop Julius C. Trimble, recently encouraged United Methodists to attend.

The Spirit is stirring. People of Faith are being swept up in its movement. As servants. As neighbors. As advocates. As activists. In a quiet moment this week (maybe during our Thursday Morning Prayer gathering) I invite you to listen and reflect:

Where is the Pentecost Spirit leading you? How are you being empowered and driven to community care?

# AN UPDATE ON OUR MINISTRY IN NICARAGUA

Since 2008, Asbury First has supported the people of Nicaragua with prayers, visits, sponsorships and more. That relationship, while still a blessing, became much more challenging in 2022 when the Ortega regime closed thousands of non-profits including Project Chacocente. Thankfully, the families who previously lived in the Managua city dump and started a new life at Chacocente retained their homes and farmland on the Chacocente campus. But the government claimed all other property on the campus, including the well and Chacocente Christian School.

We are grateful that the beautiful school campus—built over the years by the Chacocente Families alongside hundreds of North American visitors (including dozens from Asbury First)—now operates solely under the Ministry of Education, still enrolling children from not only Chacocente but also the surrounding neighborhood. The community well continues to provide safe drinking water for the school and the Families.





Because Project Chacocente remains a 501(c)3 in the United States, we continue to support eight Nicaraguan students through our Chacocente Scholars Program. Currently, the program provides tuition assistance for one high school student and seven in university programs. Areas of study include nursing, civil engineering, medicine, graphic design, computer science, and marketing. Education will provide them with the best means for obtaining meaningful employment and a better way of life.

God calls us to "Make disciples of all nations," and the board of directors of Project Chacocente hopes to continue serving not only the people of Nicaragua but also others living in Central America seeking relief from poverty.

### Asbury First Women's Art Class — Watercolor Painting



### Tuesdays, 3 pm, Gathering Center, \$10 pay at the door


Join us for our weekly sessions of Gentle Yoga. This gentle attention can help both to bring inner awareness to your body, as well as clarity and peace to the mind!


### Men's Devotional Group


